A Note From MFPE President Amanda Curtis

Together, MFPE members held our own throughout the 2025

Legislature. We stood together to defend our professions, our paychecks, and our pensions. Undeterred by the political culture warriors trying to pit Montanan against Montanan, we strengthened public services and public schools for every family. Starting now, we will lift up legislators who stood with us and make sure legislators who turned their backs on workers are held accountable. This scorecard–while not comprehensive of all our work at the committee level– reflects each legislators' support for our shared values.

There are a lot of lobbyists in the halls of the Capitol, bending ears and buying booze. They cannot compete with the organization and volume we bring. That's how we maintained cities' and counties' authority to control their own budgets and spending decisions. That's how we preserved non-partisan courts and school boards. That's how we kept privatization at bay.

We held the line on Montana's promise of stable pensions and dignified retirement for public employees. Together, we secured bipartisan support to right a wrong made by the 2023 Legislature when the age new

From passing our member-bargained Pay Plan in HB 13 to defeating attempts to bust our rights as union members, MFPE members executed our adopted Legislative Program with grit and grace. This session was the third in a row where thousands of Rapid Response Team members flooded legislators' inboxes and voicemails and text messages. We used our expertise, our public service, and the trust our communities place in us to secure major wins.

On a six degree President's Day and braving the worst roads of the winter, over 500 MFPE members showed up at the Capitol to make it clear that public service is a public good. We rallied and then broke bread with legislators. Together, we stripped the politics out of our conversations and helped legislators focus on families and students.

That President's Day of Action and the day in and day out work of our Rapid Response Team defeated both HB 320's unaccountable voucher scheme and SB 94's attack on our union rights. highway patrol troopers and sheriff's deputies could access their retirements was raised. Unfortunately, Governor Gianforte vetoed SB 7. The fight continues to honor the service and sacrifices of MFPE members' in law enforcement.

We also had a not-so-secret weapon in the twenty-two MFPE member legislators serving this session. There is no one better able to speak to our professions and our needs than us. I am so proud of these legislators and am in awe of the fight they brought to the Capitol this year. I know you'll join me in thanking them and I hope you consider joining them by running-regardless of what party you identify with-in 2026.

We're looking ahead. We're looking ahead to bargaining the next Pay Plan. We're going to fight hard to fix our broken school funding formula. And we're going to elect another responsible, fair legislature for 2027. Let's do this, MFPE!



Bill Summaries

WE HB 13 John Fitzpatrick (R-Philipsburg)

Short Title: State Employee Pay Plan
Summary: MFPE member-negotiated pay plan including pay raise of \$1 per hour or 2.5% (whichever is greater) both years of the biennium, per diem increase, and freeze on single-member health insurance cost. Combined, the 2023 & 2025 Pay Plans add a minimum \$10,400 to full-time wages.
MFPE Position: Support

Vote(s) recorded: House & Senate 3rd Readings

Status: Signed by the governor

WE SB 204 Greg Herz (R-Polson)

WON! Short Title: Sunset or reapprove existing voter approved property tax levies Summary: Places a 10 year sunset on all voter-approved levies, potentially ending crucial services in communities across the state. This interferes with local control. MFPE Position: Oppose

Vote(s) recorded: Senate 3rd Reading **Status:** Died in the Senate

WE HB 838 Brandon Ler (R-Savage)

WON! Short Title: Allow supreme court justices to use partisan affiliation
Summary: Allows supreme court justices to declare party affiliation, inserting partisan politics into our judicial races.
MFPE Position: Oppose
Vote(s) recorded: House 2nd Reading Status: Died in the House

WE HB 646 Brandon Ler (R-Savage)

WON! Short Title: Elect supreme court by districts

Summary: Upends our Supreme Court elections by removing the statewide vote on candidates and instead electing by district. This limits candidate pools and prioritizes regional over statewide interests.

MFPE Position: Oppose

Vote(s) recorded: House 2nd Reading Status: Died in the House

WE SB 385 Tom Mcgillvray (R-Billings)

Short Title: Establish a general claims court

Summary: Creates a new court to handle cases like constitutional challenges to recently passed legislation. Judges would be appointed by the governor, which increases partisan influence on the judiciary.

MFPE Position: Oppose Vote(s) recorded: Senate 2nd Reading Status: Died in the Senate



Please note: this voting record does not reflect the hundreds of bills our members lobbied for or against during the 2025 session. Most of our legislative wins happened at the committee level, and this scorecard only includes votes on bills that made it to the full House and/or Senate.

Bill Summaries

WE HB 320 Lee Deming (R-Laurel)

WON! Short Title: Establish the MT's academic prosperity program for scholars act Summary: Creates an unaccountable voucher scheme siphoning millions of dollars in scarce resources from public schools. Families already in private schools would benefit the most and the 90% of students in Montana would suffer.

MFPE Position: Oppose Vote(s) recorded: Senate 3rd Reading Status: Died in the House

WE SB 299 John Fuller (R-Kalispell)

WON! Short Title: Revise laws related to enhancing transparency in education
Summary: Increases reporting requirements by teachers. A district employee must report all information regarding educational records; extracurricular projects or activities; physical, emotional or mental health.
MFPE Position: Oppose
Vote(s) recorded: Senate 3rd Reading Status: Died in the Senate

WE HB 509 Debo Power (D-Polebridge)

WON! Short Title: Revise the quality educator loan forgiveness program to expand eligibility Summary: Expands the educator loan forgiveness program to all newly hired teachers with priority given to those in impacted schools.

MFPE Position: Support Vote(s) recorded: Senate 2nd, House 3rd Status: Signed by the governor

WE HB 15 David Bedey (R-Hamilton)

WON! Short Title: Implement K-12 Inflation Summary: 3% inflationary increase on all components of the school funding formula. MFPE Position: Support Vote(s) recorded: House & Senate 3rd Reading Status: Signed by the governor

WE HB 471 Jedidiah Hinkle (R-Belgrade)

LOST Short Title: Revise laws related to enhancing transparency in education Summary: Unconstitutional bill that infringes on Board of Public Education's right to set standards by establishing a new instructional category; opens teachers to discipline actions by the Board of Public Education.

MFPE Position: Oppose Vote(s) recorded: House & Senate 3rd Readings Status: Signed by the governor

WE HB 927 Lukas Schubert (R-Kalispell)

WON! Short Title: Generally revise laws related to illegal aliens

Summary: Unconstitutional bill requiring school and other public employees to determine immigration status of students/clients and report to MT Department of Justice. Creates new misdemeanor offense for public employees.

MFPE Position: Oppose Vote(s) recorded: House 2nd Reading Status: Died in the House

- WE SB 94 John Fuller (R-Kalispell)
- WON! Short Title: Generally revise public sector union laws

Summary: Requires all union business, including safety and labor-management meetings, to be conducted off the clock. Ends the MFPE Educator Conference. **MFPE Position:** Oppose

Vote(s) recorded: Senate 2nd Reading Status: Died in the Senate

WE HB 85 Marta Bertoglio (R-Clancy)

WON! Short Title: Reinstating former employer contributions for JRS, HPORS, SRS, GWPORS Summary: Returns to legislatively determined employer pension contributions for law enforcement, restoring stability after the 2023 Legislature opted to have contributions set by outside entities.
MFPE Position: Support Vote(s) recorded: House & Senate 3rd Reading Status: Signed by the governor

WE SB 7 Wendy McKamey (R-Great Falls)

LOST Short Title: Repeal of retirement criteria for HPORS and SRS

Summary: Restores Montana's promise of dignified retirements to law enforcement officers by removing 2023's age 50 retirement requirement for certain law enforcement officers.

MFPE Position: Support Vote(s) recorded: House & Senate 3rd Reading

Status: Vetoed by the governor

WE HB 400 Braxton Mitchell (R-C. Falls)

 LOST Short Title: Enact the "Free to Speak" act Summary: Mandates when a teacher or school can and cannot discipline students for engaging in discriminatory behaviors.
MFPE Position: Oppose Vote(s) recorded: House & Senate 3rd Reading

Status: Signed by the governor
